John 9

PHILOSOPHY OF SUFFERING

John 9:1-2 – As he went along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Suffering for personal or family sin Suffering for human error or malfeasance Suffering due to genetic causes Suffering for no known cause Suffering in a fallen world

ANOTHER OPTION

John 9:3-5 – "Neither this man nor his parents sinned, but this happened so that the work of God might be displayed in his life. As long as it is day, we must do the work of him who sent me. Night is coming when no one can work. While I am in the world, I am the light of the world."

UNIQUE PROCEDURE

John 9:6-7 – Having said this, he spit on the ground, made some mud with the saliva, and put it on the man's eyes. "Go," he told him, "wash in the Pool of Siloam" (this word means Sent). So the man went and washed, and came home seeing.

BLINDNESS OF THE HEART John 9:25 – "One thing I do know. I was blind but now I see!" Neighbors Parents Religious Leaders

VISION OF FAITH John 9:35-38 "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" "Who is he, sir? Tell me so that I may believe in him." "You have now seen him; in fact, he is the one speaking with you." Then the man said, "Lord, I believe," and he worshiped him.
